From the desk of Reverend Ken . . .

Our service January 9 was a focus on the baptism of Jesus – “and the Holy Spirit descended upon him in bodily form like a dove. And a voice came from heaven, ‘You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased.’ ” (Luke 3) I offered everyone a virtual baptism. So now you’ve heard of it – a virtual baptism. But it wasn’t meant to be a Sacrament, I meant it to be an opportunity to self-assure and to understand God’s constant presence of loving encouragement in one’s life. Unfortunately there is an overwhelming message of fear and the degradation of humanity in many pastor’s theology.

I know very well that pastors everywhere want the best for their congregants, however I know that a theology that says humanity can never overcome a sinful nature is prevalent in most any denomination. You know this, as you have heard it and experienced it. At my final worship service in Essex, CT, I offered that God saw glory in every human being. The spouse of a special musician there for the final day called me later assuring me that he knew I meant well but that I was wrong – God does not find glory in humanity. I didn’t let him continue. I know that such teaching is strong and resides in most people’s hearts. But I believe God’s heart sees your goodness, understands your doubt and hopes for good. And like the majority of parents, God’s heart is so tender for YOU.

Would you join me in praying regularly for yourself first, and then all the people, speaking words of grace and affirmation, encouragement and hope, courage and kindness? Dig deep into the pool of baptism and freely pour out your intention of good will.

Becoming known as the church that lives gracefully might encourage seekers who would otherwise not be







CONSISTORY MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

Consistory Minutes — November

- 2022 EUCC budget submitted by Brian to Consistory via email: Question from Laura Kemp via email prompted discussion regarding unused Mission funds from 2021 to be carried over to 2022. Ann Kress made a motion to take the proposed budget to Congregational meeting on Dec. 12. Chuck Seigel second. Vote taken. All were in favor. No objections.
 - Standing Committee Reports: All received via email.
 - Worship and Music: Charlotte informed Consistory that as of tonight, there is no knowledge of a Thanksgiving eve service planned by HACC.
- New Business:
- New Consistory members for 2022: Chuck Bauer has agreed to join EUCC Consistory starting in the new year. Lisa will ask Maria to add a note to her communications asking for additional interest in congregants to serve on Consistory.
 - Diversity Alliance office space: Consistory discussion regarding allowing for office space to the left of the chapel during church hours. NOTE: new information received since this meeting has Consistory re-thinking this proposal. Will be discussed again at the next meeting.
 - January 2022: Megan Alcott will be replacing Lisa Moore as chair of the Personnel Committee.
 - Charlotte addressed consistory to say that Pastor Seiler's gift is complete and will be presented after the Benediction on Sunday, November 28. She asked about the Dec. 5 reception for Rev. Ken. Lisa Moore talked to Mary Bair, who has everything organized.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Christian Education Committee — January

- We continue to have 2-6 children in Sunday School each week. Our lessons are focused on one of the lectionary readings for the week using the Spark Lectionary curriculum. In recent weeks the children have learned about Mary's visit to Elizabeth, the birth of Jesus, Jesus as a boy in the temple, Jesus the Word, and the wedding at Cana.
- The schedule for Sunday School and nursery volunteers for January and February continues. As a result, Sunday School will continue to be staffed every week but the nursery may be closed some weeks due to staffing shortage. Parents should still feel free to take their little ones to the nursery if needed. They will be able to hear the service. There will be no Sunday School on January 30 since children will be leading the service on that date.
- I will soon be asking volunteers to let me know their availability for March, April and May.

- Adult Learning Hour will start a new study on January 23, 2022 at 9 am Sundays in person in Bowers Chapel and simultaneously on Zoom. The group will be doing a five-week study of "You Were Made for This Moment: How the Story of Esther Inspires Us to Step Up and Stand Out for God." This study is by Max Lucado. This group is coordinated by Brian Frederick.

Church Growth Committee — January

- Church Growth Committee Charter review and discussion: Committee approved the following charter. Also, the Committee voted Charlotte Pinette as Co-Chair.
Purpose: The Church Growth Committee is charged with two key growth components:
 - ◇ *Outreach:* promoting EUCC and its programs for the purpose of recruitment of new and lapsed members. Goal is to increase membership by 10 per year.
 - ◇ *Inreach:* make EUCC a welcoming place where members and visitors become quickly familiar with each other and feel encouraged to join in activities and committees.

Objectives:

- ◇ Increase awareness of EUCC and its offerings
 - ◇ Increase church membership
 - ◇ Make EUCC a welcoming place both visually and socially in coordination with other church committees
 - ◇ Investigate relevant community partnerships that have potential to generate awareness or growth
 - ◇ Assist other committees with outreach for their programs
 - ◇ Generate community goodwill
- As part of the Charter, the committee also approved membership guidelines, a meeting schedule and time commitment expectations.
- Inreach: 'Getting to Know You' campaign
 - ◇ Jean has written a project description and instruction guide and shared with Rev. Ken and Alec for their thoughts. Jean to send final version to Alec who will present to Consistory for their input.
 - ◇ Campaign to roll out in phases: Phase I: Consistory and Church Growth committee complete their profiles; Phase II: All other Committees complete their profiles; Phase III: All members complete their profiles
 - ◇ Committee bulletin board: To increase awareness among our members of our many committees and their focus, Charlotte P. will create a bulletin board which showcases each

committee with a photo of the Committee Chair and the committee's function.

- Outreach
 - ◇ Community Healing Hour (temporary name) to be held in Bowers Chapel beginning March 2, Ash Wednesday.
 - ◇ Downtown Hanover 2022 mailing/flyer
 - ◇ Retirement Community Outreach to draw in new visitors.

Missions Committee — January

- God's Meal Barrel summary of 2021 efforts: They helped to feed about 900 families, and provided 80 Thanksgiving turkeys, 50 Christmas hams, \$3,500 in gift cards, 200 school backpacks, and 400 sets of PJs. They have purchased a new walk-in fridge, but are waiting to install it until they find out whether they can continue to rent the facility on Baltimore St.
- Hanover Area Council of Churches has a new director: Marie Burgos. Our next PAL Lunch at HACC is March 29. Contact Estelle King to volunteer for the 9-11 am shift (food prep) or the 11-1 shift (package meals and clean up).
- Homewood Auxiliary: Compassionate Crafters are making bed pads for residents. Donations of new and gently used pillow cases are welcome.
- New Hope Ministries is still totaling items donated to the Feed-A-Friend Marathon, currently at 153,000 cans. Jody Adelsperger and John Wheeler purchased 300 pounds of cleaning and personal care items with the \$200 donation from Missions funds and delivered them to New Hope.
- The Christmas Fund offering to benefit needy UCC pastors and other UCC employees totaled \$542, to which Missions added \$1,000.
- Missions continues to attend meetings at All Saints Episcopal in Hanover to plan for the arrival of an Afghan refugee family. We have volunteered Emmanuel to coordinate grocery collection and possible storage space for donated furniture.
- The collection for Church World Service blankets will be Feb. 13.

Property & Safety Committee — January

- The last month has seen some minor heating issues, including an issue within an air conditioning duct. Our boiler was inspected in early January, a mandated every two-year inspection. The results were favorable. A fire/smoke sensor located in the air conditioning duct above the auditorium was replaced, due to its malfunction resulting in multiple false signals.

- Our snow removal team again stopped too soon, leaving a section of sidewalk snow-covered. Larry took care of that part and the snow removal people were notified. Our supply of ice melt was replenished. The snow removal people have a key to the shed and have access to that material when they need it.
- The new spotlights which shine on the Testament windows were well received at Christmas time. The screening on the security light above the sidewalk on the side has reduced the light shining on the neighbor's windows, but it has also reduced the light on the sidewalk. We've received an estimate for two smaller lights, each with two heads, to be installed in the spot where the existing light is located and further along the sidewalk toward Broadway. These lights would help with our cameras at night, allowing us to see more clearly along the length of that sidewalk. The movable heads would allow us to focus the light away from the neighbor, but also allow us to focus directly on the sidewalk. We'll take a look when the weather warms up.
- The high louvers on the towers are still uncovered by screens. They are so attractive that the temptation is to leave them that way. However, the screens fence out birds and protect the louvers. A lift is needed to install the screens, so if we wait to see what happens, we risk damage to the new sidewalks and curb that are being installed in the early spring. A definitive answer about aluminum frames for those screens should be available soon.

Worship & Music Committee — January

- A review of the worship services of past month services and stats. There is a 10 percent rise in statistics from last December.
- Don and Jamie are ordering a new microphone headset for Rev Ken.
- Sunday, January 30, 2022, will be the children's Christmas program during church.
- Discussing taking orders for Spaghetti sauce and Egg dressing, will decide at February meeting.
- Ash Wednesday, March 2, 2022, will be livestreamed from the sanctuary.
- All donations from Joan Wertzberger memorial, per the family, have been designated to Music Fund. Don plans on another concert in memory of Joan's memory this spring if possible and another next year.
- If someone is added to prayer list, ask if ok to use last name, especially when being spoken on livestreamed services.
