## From the desk of Rev. Ken...

o much to convey and pray....

Hi, friends and fellow travelers. My wife Suzanne and I just returned from time away – a vacation to Houston and Galveston Island, Texas. I found Houston to be very nice, actually; huge, but nice. Galveston, a town of 50,000 sits on a long stretch of island, with lots of land to yet build upon. I say that because I saw it as charming, historic, beach beautiful, and filled with incredible eateries. Texas is a very different place than PA – open carry, warmth in winter, cheap gas, 14-lane highways, and open, unfettered, inter-racial couples. I found it a place to be lovingly charged. And yet, finding the charge was nearly impossible!

You see, our vacation package included the use of a rented, electric car. GREAT car seeking to "hook-up" with an actual charging station. Despite it being an oil town we saw that Houston had over 800 charging stations! However, anxiety ruled our days as the charging stations were either far further away than advertised, didn't actually exist at many of the addresses we were instructed to go to, were stationed within parking garages that charged you for both the electric AND the garage stay, and when finding one appearing to want to charge us the charging station was not communicating through the internet to its company nor to the application on our cell phone. Actually finding one – we were desperately approaching a low reserve of power in our batteries. We hooked up, gave the station our credit card number, and, were driven away in a gas-operated car by Suzanne's sister and husband whom we had warned about getting an electric car before they arrived.

Knowing we'd have to wait 7 hours for a full charge, we went off to enjoy our first day of sun and pool festivities – except for the nagging concern in my wife's heart about where our car was, and whether it was receiving a charge. As earlier, the phone app wasn't reaching the charging station and so we opted to float in the lazy river.




## Association plans Epiphany Party

Just after dinner we went to the car. Suzanne got a message, a dreaded message... our charger had stopped charging an hour after we had dropped it off!!! Oy. With a twisted gut, I sat in the driver's seat and glanced at the dashboard and its digital report – 96% CHARGED!!!!!!!!!! 6 days later we still don't know how much our credit card was "charged."

We travel our long roads, making short advances here and there along the way. How often have you felt directionless, a lack of situational awareness, not knowing if your finances will match your needs, feeling foreign, losing "control" of where you're at, how you're at, with whom you're at? I swear there are days when all those questions apply. But other times I feel at least at ease.

In all reality, God is in control, somehow, somewhere, some why. And don't you think that's best? At this Advent time, the waiting for the celebration of the birth of Jesus, start NOW, this moment, to let go of any feelings of absolute "control" over life. Why? Each of us goes along with confidence until a feeling, an action, an outside event breaks through our sense of control and disturbs us to the point of disappointment.

Traditional faith so often tells us "800 chargers in town," meaning to say "all you need to do is assume control because even if things run out,

God's chargers are gonna be at hand." I say and have experienced that such just isn't the case. Honestly, it's not easy to throw up our hands and to declare to God, "my life is yours God, your control, my surrender." As days of Thanksgiving appear our hearts sort of melt a bit. As our calendars fill up with holiday observations, the melt continues greatly and paves a path to the possibility of a daily, Godly presence. I urge you but never demand or expect you to use this both melancholy and celebratory time to "let go, and let God." I urge you to make room in your ego (that's a pretty grand space, is it not?) to let in God to be your controller. I am fairly certain that with a daily hug to God from within, the control we used to think was awesome, can charge itself with no extra fees.

I love ya, and you should know that God's fine tuning brings your life to hook up at the easiest and closest charger.

#### **CONSISTORY MEETING HIGHLIGHTS**

#### Consistory Minutes — October

October minutes were approved November 20.

- Treasurer's Report: Received via email prior to the meeting. Brian elaborated on the normal documents that were sent prior to the meeting. Brian noted that it was a poor income month and unfortunately a high expenses month, although they are still under budget for the year. Brian noted that to date, 33% of pledges are electronic. Bill asked if pledges are trending the same as previous years. Brian said that often there is fluctuation when we have interim positions. Brian noted that on Oct. 2, the Choir Savings account was closed with approximately \$47,000 transferred into the checking account. The funds are shown in the Music Fund Balance, not the General Operating Fund, with monies staying within the Music program, and a report will be run quarterly. Cheryl Fritz made a motion to accept the Treasurer's Report subject to audit. Judy Morris second. Vote taken. All in favor. Vote passed.
- 2024 Budget Review: Brian led the Consistory through the proposed budget line by line with commentary. Notes:
  - ♦ Brian proposed a 2024 Budget with a \$300.70 difference between expenses and income.
  - Sean Moore reviewed the 2024 Capital Expenditures (Brownstone steps, Courtyard I & II). Architectural drawings are complete and paid for and Permit was delivered to Randy Brady.
  - PennDot unfortunately damaged our curbing and dented the drain – they have been notified. Sean will call Randy to press for dates for Brownstone step replacement.

Brain asked Consistory to consider how to fund these items by the next meeting. The \$15,000 for the Brownstone work can be covered within the 2023 budget, however \$47,000 will need to be found to cover the Courtyard I & II expenses in 2024 budget. He recommended using Memorial Funds and EUCC savings or suggested a possible fundraising campaign.

Chuck S. and Brian asked Committee Chairs to further review their committee budget line items to see if there are any expenses that can be cut/reduced.

'Things' board next to the Buddy Board. Will review once the Buddy folders come down.

- Greeters: Clip board is working and people are signing up.
- Free Merchandiser ads: Sent out Chapel, Reader's Café, Crafters, Games and Mindfulness info to the paper and Charlotte asked for them to appear monthly.
- Social Media presence: Abe posted Sunday Concert; Charlotte will reach out to Abe and ask him to post Bingo asap; Maria began a subscription to Canva for graphics design.

#### Missions Committee — November

- The current balance of Missions funds is \$5,501.
- A donation of \$500 from Missions funds provided 40 turkeys to God's Meal Barrel. They expect to provide Thanksgiving dinner to 75-100 people. Donations of children's PJ's up to size 14 are encouraged for Santa's Sleepers.
- At the PAL Lunch on Oct. 31, Emmanuel volunteers served 201 lunches and 39 Meals on Wheels. We will pinch hit for an additional lunch on Nov. 21. Our next regularly scheduled lunch will be Jan. 30. Contact Estelle King.
- We appreciate Andy Crone's years of coordinating Emmanuel's participation in the CROP Walk. This year about 15 churches participated. Emmanuel members donated \$115, and \$1,000 was donated from the Missions fund.
- Dwight and Judy Dubs, Emmanuel's reps to the Hanover Area Council of Churches, attended the November meeting. About 30 churches were represented. Expenses for the previous year include building repairs and a new alarm system. Requests have been made for about \$800,000 in grants. Ruth's Harvest numbers will likely increase from 190 to 300 children when they start serving middle school children. HACC is currently searching for a coordinating pastor.
- The Hoffman Homes Gala hosted 247 attendees, including 5 members and friends of Emmanuel. Info on the proceeds will follow.
- New Hope's Feed-A-Friend food collection marathon will take place Dec. 7 from noon-8pm and Dec. 8 from 8am-4 pm. We can pledge food or financial donations on WHVR 1280 radio at those times. Missions will donate \$1,000.
- The Homewood Auxiliary is collecting Bingo prizes, such as costume jewelry and other small items. Emmanuel members are invited to send Christmas messages to Homewood residents in Nursing or Personal Care. Use your own cards or cards provided at Fellowship Hour. Cards will be delivered on Dec. 6. Contact Peg Moulton.

- Hanover Against Hunger: 23 members and friends of Emmanuel helped package 200,000 rice meals the weekend of Nov. 5. These meals were sent to Manila and other communities in the Philippines. The next meal packing event will be in 2025.
- Thanks to all who donated to our combined Harvest Home and Communion Gifts collection. A total of 280.7 pounds of food and 30 hygiene items were delivered to local food banks the following day.
- We are still awaiting news about our new sponsored child in the Philippines. We agreed to wire the \$1,320 yearly fee for schooling for our sponsored child in South Africa.
- Fisher House: On Nov. 12, In recognition of Veterans Day, photos of veterans from Emmanuel were shown and a collection was taken for Fisher House, which covers expenses for families of hospitalized vets. The collection totals \$521.

#### **Property Committee — November**

- Routine maintenance of the church building and property continue as scheduled.
- The curbing in front of the church office was replaced prior to the resurfacing of Broadway in October. The completion of this project will allow for the replacement of the Brownstone steps leading to the entrance of the church office. Randy Brady Masonry is contracted to replace the steps and railings in accordance to local building codes. Professional drawings and building permits were obtained and forwarded to the masonry company. Work will begin as weather allows. In addition to the Brownstone steps, the sidewalk in front of the office will need to be replaced.
- Additional masonry will be completed in the Courtyard. The bricks covering the courtyard between the church and the office will be taken up, the surface re-graded for proper drainage, and the bricks will be returned. Memorial bricks will be removed carefully, saved and put back.

#### Worship & Music Committee — November
