# Happy Earth Day from your Church Growth team!

To celebrate Earth Day, the Church Growth team is giving out "Growfetti" – flower shaped biodegradable seed paper. The directions are simple: Just soak seed paper overnight, tear it up, plant under a thin layer of soil in a sunny spot, and water gently and regularly until your flower seedlings sprout. Made by Bloomin Seed, the eco-friendly seed papers are created with 100 percent post-industrial, recycled paper dyed with all-natural, vegetable-based pigments, in corn-based packaging, made in the U.S. in a solar-powered production facility.

# Earth Day

This day brings together individuals, communities, and organizations worldwide to raise awareness about the pressing environmental issues our planet faces and to advocate for positive change. It is a time to reflect on our collective responsibility to protect the Earth's precious ecosystems, biodiversity, and natural resources for future generations. Earth Day inspires action, encouraging people to adopt eco-friendly practices, promote renewable energy sources, reduce waste, and support initiatives that aim to combat climate change. Through education, activism, and collaboration, Earth Day fosters a renewed commitment to preserving and cherishing our beautiful planet.

# What Can We as Churches Do to Care for God's Creation?

As Christians, we are called to care for all of creation: land, water, air, animals, plants, people – all of it. Dawn Dole shares that at the Federated Church, UCC, in the small village of Chagrin Falls, Ohio, they have been dedicated to a theology and practice of creation care for many years. Over time, Federated Church has shifted and expanded their scope of concern and action. In the past six years, the focus has transitioned from recycling and energy conservation to include social and environmental justice advocacy. Here are some activity and program ideas they have implemented over the years in the hopes that it might stimulate and inspire other churches in answering the call to care for God's creation.

# Worship: Setting a Theological and Spiritual Foundation

• Extend creation care worship throughout the year. Songs, hymns, prayers, sermons, scripture – all take on new life when we express continued love and care for God's Creation.

# Awareness Building: Learning How Environmental Issues Impact Some More Than Others

- · Host movie nights with discussion.
- · Host book studies or, in our case, we held a "Book Journey."
- · Host speaker nights Invite local experts in environmental justice to come talk to your church. It is engaging, informative and often leads to action and partnerships.
- · Invite your church council and all of your church's committees to engage in conversations and decisions about our environmental impact.

# Action: Putting Our Faith into Practice

- · If your church does not already have a recycling program, start one. It is easy and everyone can participate.
- · Use environmentally friendly products in cleaning, gardening, and hosting events at your church.
- · Include a list of environmental actions or tips each month in your newsletter.
- · Do an energy audit to see if your church can improve its energy usage.
- · Explore alternative, renewable energy for your church.
- · Plant trees.
- · Collaborate with other churches and community organizations already working in the environmental justice field.
- · Participate in the UCC's Creation Justice Ministries, and join your local UCC association or conference Environmental Justice Network.

The main thing is to do *something*. Start the conversation. Explore the issues. Invite experts in. Form action groups. Inform and engage your congregation. Start small or big, but just start. You can do it. ~From The Pollinator
