The words to “Let It Be” came to me after pondering through my vacation and long before that as well. They come to me because I’m haunted by the difference how I feel about “the church” and by how a greater and greater number of the world feel about “the church.” How do I, as a leader who has felt the “Call” of God to live a life of service, devotion, and compassion within a world where all of those things can be practiced and taught outside of the church?

It’s true you know anyone can do service, be devoted in reverence, and offer compassion to themselves and to the world – they need not proclaim a belief or faith stance. I see and hear of wondrous works of love, compassion and service being gifted to the world every single day by people who don’t know of a faith, have been wounded by a “believer” or their institution (church, mosque, synagogue), or who reason that there is no divine or supernatural being from which gifts of kindness emanate or have been taught.

The question “Why church?” has been heard or contemplated quite regularly. It’s not that this question is new – “Why God?” has existed since the dawn of human thought. The adherence or the rejection to faith systems has waxed and waned throughout human history. I know for a fact that in order to matter, my God does not “need” human beings but rather hopes for our

Coffee Hour is back!


After an absence of more than two years, food and fellowship have returned.

CONSISTORY MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

Consistory Minutes — January

- Treasurer's Report: Brian Frederick reviewed the highlights of his 2021 year-end report: Expense exceed Income by \$10,238; Income was under budget by \$41,566; we only transferred \$40,000 of the planned \$55,200 from Unrestricted Funds; and Expense was under budget by \$31,330.
- Consistory welcomed Chuck Bauer and thanked him for joining Consistory for 2022.
- Charlotte Pinette reviewed the Diversity Alliance's needs for meeting space, and Consistory approved their use of facilities for monthly board meetings and speaker series.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Church Growth Committee — March

- Bowers Chapel opened March 2 with four visitors.
- The downtown "Every Door Direct Mail" mailer is planned for late spring.
- A new color trifold welcome brochure will be printed.
- Sunday Greeters: Chuck Bauer will be scheduling greeters moving forward.
- Committee Chairs/Co-chairs photos: All photos have been framed and Charlotte and Larry will hang them in King Auditorium.
- Event/Bulletin Board: The committee suggested that the board topics rotate to generate congregational engagement.
- Getting to Know You Campaign: Consistory will be asked to complete them by April 10.

Missions Committee — March

- The Clothing Bank at Hanover Area Council of Churches has been refurbished. White plastic grocery bags are needed, as are volunteers.
- New Hope Ministries continues to offer job training. The next Job Fair is April 14.
- The community refugee effort continues to move forward. About 70 refugee families are expected to arrive in southcentral PA by June. Not all will be Afghan. Emmanuel is working with Zwingli UCC in East Berlin to provide food and household supplies. The next meeting, open to the community, is March 22 at 6:30 pm at All Saints Episcopal on McCosh St.
- The collection for Church World Service blankets totaled \$1,010. Missions will match it 1:1 for a total donation of \$2,020.
- The One Great Hour of Sharing offering takes place on March 27. This offering brings many denominations and agencies together to provide help for refugees and disaster victims, as well as health, education, and improved farming practices.

- The Lenten Heifer Project continues through the Easter season. The final collection date is April 24. We hope to match donations from the congregation with funds from Missions to once again donate \$5,000 and become an Ark Church.
- We were pleased to welcome 3 visitors from Emmanuel to our meeting. Their enthusiasm and suggestions energized our meeting. We invite anyone interested in Missions efforts to come to our next meeting. Ask questions, offer suggestions and consider becoming a member of Missions. Our next meeting is April 13 at 1 pm.

Property & Safety Committee — March

- The Property and Safety Committee met March 10. This meeting followed closely the presentation from the Hanover Borough Police Department on safety in a situation with an aggressor on the premises (photo at right). The suggestion was made by the police officer who presented that Emmanuel hold drills on evacuation and behavior in a fire or aggressor situation. This committee will be planning such drills in the next month or so. Drills will be held on Sunday morning after or during worship.
- We will be looking for a space to keep the frames used for screening over the exterior louvers, in case they need to be replaced. The space beneath the sanctuary is the most likely storage space for them.
- We're waiting for an estimate for repairs to the roof above the Gathering Space where water came in this winter. The painter has submitted his final bill for that work on the louvers.
- A plasterer has given us an estimate (accepted) for repairing the arch near the Sacristy. There are three other repairs needed and he will submit an estimate for each as he is ready to begin work. His aim is to begin each repair on Monday morning and finish by Friday afternoon, but there may be a Sunday where we will need to move around scaffolding. Work on the arch should begin soon.
- A grant was offered by the state to nonprofits for the purchase of safety apparatus. We have applied for a grant to increase and upgrade lighting, cameras and access systems. This is the first part of the grant application. If our initial application is accepted, a second, more detailed application will be required.
- A few minor repairs to the boiler are under way, but won't be completed until the heating season is over. These were suggestions stemming from the inspection by the state.
- The organ blower and humidifier replacement and

repair necessitated some minor work in the enclosure in the basement. A section of the lower part of insulation was removed, having been damaged in the leak late last year.

- A foul odor has been present in the area outside the women's robing room/restroom in the lower level. Investigation is ongoing, so please be patient. It appears to be coming from two sump pumps in a utility closet and it's being addressed.
- Work on replacing the curbing and sidewalk at the front of the office will begin shortly. The courtyard replacement will follow. The entire project will take about a month. The memorial bricks will be replaced and new ones added. The Borough Water Engineer has been consulted and will work with us and the mason to achieve optimal results in drainage, given our special challenges.

Worship & Music Committee — March

- Don Horneff reported the livestreaming statistics for February noting 124 views for the month and also an increase in the in-person attendance.
- In discussing the Lenten Season services it was decided to hold the Ash Wednesday service in the sanctuary with the distribution of ashes. Palms will be distributed on Palm Sunday. The committee will wait for a decision by Consistory regarding the Maundy Thursday communion meal and annual Easter Breakfast.
- Emmanuel and Trinity UCC have been invited to a Good Friday service at Grace UCC on April 15. The committee has been charged with seeking volunteer readers for the Sunday morning services. Mary Bair will make the arrangements.


It was well into the new year by the time we received mail from overseas. Emmanuel supports two girls in southeast Asia through the UCC's Child Sponsorship Program.

acknowledgement. I believe it's a matter of accountability.

Not that humans cannot be accountable on their own, or accountable to others, but within the "right" circumstances (often simple circumstances at that) we humans have a propensity to lie to ourselves. Lying is not always wrong. Sometimes denial is an appropriate and understandable state of being to which we escape to cope with trauma. However, if we cannot recover from such denial we can find ourselves buried under layers of falsehoods which then keep us from clear thought and pure actions. Honesty is not a skill of intellect nor is it a practice of a certain socioeconomic group. Honesty is an act of humility difficult to practice with perfection. Honesty is more of a goal than a state of being.

And so, knowing that as a human I will not always be truthful, having a Higher Power with which I can confide in, confess to, or take refuge in provides me with a respite from myself and other humans – humans who cannot always be 100% honest. Revealing my inner most being and then being

seen has a mystical and reassuring power.

Just the other day I read a quote by another clergyman. They were asked generally the same question as I have in this article, "Why Church – Why God?" Their reply was profound, saying, "Because the alternatives are too terrible to contemplate."

I know all too well that if I were to rely on humanity and humanity alone, I would perish under a flood of my own doing. I love humanity; I believe in science; I affirm young people in both their desire and their naivete as being a joy to the world; I celebrate our achievements. Also with great willingness I bow down to a God that is both order and chaos, in one; I need God who is both ever-present and seemingly distant; I count on God for answers that I never hear spoken, but feel massaged beyond my pores and into my bones; I know God loves beyond my ability to understand and forgives where humanity wants to condemn.

Indeed, the alternatives are too terrible to contemplate. ~Rev. Ken
