A Mission Moment from the UCC ...

The season of Advent has begun. Four weeks till the birth of Christ. Four weeks of journeying to Bethlehem. Four weeks of lighting candles around the Advent wreath.

I love this season that begs for us to turn our back on the commercial frenzy of the holiday so that we can embrace the spiritual practices of slowing down and, as Matthew's Gospel tells us, learn to be "watchful" for we do not know when the Son of Man will return.

I will admit that I am an advocate for Advent. But no matter how hard I try to do the holidays differently than those around me, I get sucked into the busyness. And if there is one thing that I really dislike the most about this time of year, it's the gift giving.

Now before I am labeled a Grinch – or worst yet, a Scrooge – let me explain. My anxiety with Christmas gifts stems from the fact that I never have any idea whlat to get those I love. I envy those who know just what trinket would make their spouse, friend, or child smile.

Last year, I was especially drawing a blank as to what to get my father. Then two days before December 25, I remembered the jar of homemade mincemeat I had in my cupboard. I then remembered how much my father loved mincemeat pies.

I had an epiphany. I would make him a pie. The choice of this gift felt so right. I was excited to prepare it, imagining the joy on his face when I gave it to him. And the day I gave it to him, his expression of joy was better than I imagined. I realized then that being a good gift giver is all about being attentive to others – to borrow from Matthew, being

"watchful" – and truly learning how to listen.

There's a term in the Church that I happen to love, especially this time of year when we might be struggling with our Christmas shopping lists. It's "called to gift." At first glance, it might seem grammatically incorrect. Called to do what? Gift?



The connection between Pastor and Shepherd

The term "pastor" originates from the Latin word "pastor," meaning shepherd. It has long been a common metaphor in Christianity for a spiritual leader. But how does taking care of animals outdoors connect

with leading people in a Christian church? There are quite a few similarities. Both jobs require a leader to guide a group along the right path. Good shepherds show empathy for the struggles of the flock, and so do good pastors. A good shepherd has a strong bond with each sheep, while a good pastor works to develop strong bonds with each member of the congregation. A good shepherd is faithful and accountable, and a good pastor values faithfulness to the congregation over self-exaltation or personal gain. Shepherds enhance the lives of their flocks; pastors play a vital role in the spiritual life of their congregations.



CONSISTORY MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

October minutes were approved November 17

Consistory Minutes — October 20

- The Treasurer's Report: A motion to approve the Treasurer's Report subject to audit was made by Clay Reichart and seconded by Sandy Topper.
 We made our third transfer, \$27,000, from
 - We made our third transfer, \$27,000, from unrestricted funds bringing our total to \$77,000 for the year. We have also received \$16,000 from our York County Community Foundation fund.
 - As of Sept. 30, we have an overage on our gas budget. We reduced the amount from last year. We have spent \$7,255 with a budget of \$7,000.

Old Business:

 We ordered the automatic roller shades for the auditorium from Budget Blinds and paid a deposit of \$5,150. Total cost is \$6,870. Installation is scheduled for Oct. 28.

New Business:

 The Keystone Conference will have a virtual meeting Nov. 22 to review the budget. We have the ability to have 3 delegates. Charlotte Pinnette and Brian Frederick will attend.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Church Growth Committee — November 16

- Events
 - Bingo on Nov. 14 was attended by 81 persons, pizza was the favorite food, patrons asked for BBQ and soup; a cash box is needed, and a hot dog roller. Income of about \$2,000 will be split 50/50 between the church's Building Fund and missions work (final number will be determined after all expenses are paid). A successful event and we plan to continue this activity.

Updates:

- Member Appreciation puzzle pieces to be affixed and placed under the clear plastic of the food table in the auditorium.
- There will be no December meeting.

Missions Committee — November 12

- God's Meal Barrel served 260 families last month, well above their average of 200 families. 39 families were in line for food when we delivered donations from Harvest Home. GMB will provide 125 turkey dinners for Thanksgiving. Missions agreed to donate 10 \$25 Five Below gift cards for teens, as GMB requested.
- Crop Walk donations from Emmanuel totaled \$1,500. (\$1,000 from the congregation and \$500 from Missions funds.)
- Missions agreed to purchase 25 \$10 Walmart gift cards for gifts for children for JJ's Toy Shop at the Hanover Area Council of Churches. Gift cards will be purchased through Emmanuel's Gift Card plan.

- The annual Gala for Hoffman Homes was a huge success, with proceeds of \$111,000. Carol Giesey, Estelle King and Marilyn Van Lenten were among the 288 guests. Emmanuel's bird-themed basket sold for \$180 at the silent auction. Next year's gala is scheduled for Oct. 30.
- There are still opportunities to purchase gifts for children at Hoffman Homes. See Estelle King for info about specific gifts that the children have requested. Gifts must be delivered by Dec. 3. To volunteer to help wrap these gifts Dec. 10-12, contact Hoffman Homes.
- Communion Gifts/Harvest Home donations totaled 61 pounds of food, 4 cleaning and 63 hygiene items on Nov. 2, and 32 pounds of food on Nov. 9. All items were delivered to the 3 local food banks.
- Crafters have gathered 145 winter weather items for distribution. Their goal is 165 items. See Sandy Rebert or Marilyn Van Lenten.
- The Hanover Trolley Trail now extends to Jacobs Mill Road. See Peg Moulton if you are interested in a group walking tour of the new trail.
- We will send Christmas cards from the congregation to our 3 sponsored children in South Africa, the Philippines and India. Cards will be available for signing in the next few weeks.
- The Fisher House Foundation collection, to provide temporary housing for families of hospitalized vets, took place on Nov. 9.
 Emmanuel's collection totals over \$300, with the option of sending donations directly to Fisher House in postage-paid envelopes. See Estelle for more info.
- One source of hurricane relief for areas affected by Hurricane Melissa (Jamaica, Haiti and Cuba) is coming through the national UCC, in partnership with Church World Service, and other organizations. Donations may be placed in collection baskets located in the sanctuary through Nov. 23.
- Missions agreed to donate \$300 from Missions funds to pay for the cost of printing first response information for immigrants living in the Hanover area. The printing will be done through the Hanover Area Diversity Alliance
