Lastly I would like to wish you a Happy New Year and Merry Christmas in advance to you and your loved ones as we celebrate the holiday season

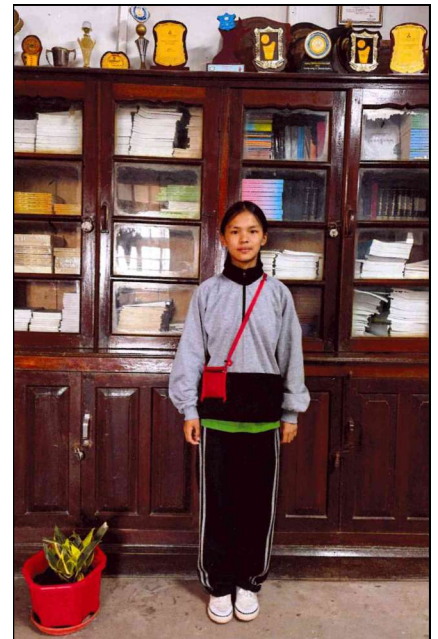
and look forward to the New Year.

CONSISTORY MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

December minutes were approved January 19

Consistory Minutes — December 15

- Treasurer's Report: A motion to approve the November Treasurer's Report subject to audit was made by Sean Moore and seconded by JJ Dugan. Notes: Income was helped by a check from the York County Community Foundation of almost \$90,000 in November, which is normally received in December; expenses are fairly close to the budgeted amount. We have gone over with utility costs.
- President's Report: We will reorganize Consistory in January, thank you Judy and Alec for serving three consecutive 3-year terms; Jan Hagenberger and Dan Trimmer were voted into Consistory at the December Congregational Meeting and will begin their terms in January; we will need a new VP starting in January.
- Property Committee Report: For snow removal, A new contract was made for \$350 per weather event for salt and snow removal; the boiler looks like it will make it through the rest of the winter season but Sean shared different options that we have for replacement. The proposed cost of the options has not been received.
- A motion was made to approve \$14,624 from the Memorial Fund to be used to pay for asbestos abatement by Clay Reichart and seconded by Alec Sivel.

New Business:

- W&M Committee discussed installation of an electronic sign outside the church to draw more attention to events. Concerns were raised regarding ordinances and cost. Brian will investigate pricing.
- Discussion took place regarding recognition of volunteers at the church.
- Tim Kress is working with us to see if we can locate a used oven to replace the current oven. The group decided that we wanted to set a \$2,000 limit for the replacement and \$500 for cleaning and installation.
- Discussion took place regarding promotion of letting members know how they could make a gift to the church in their estate planning. Will refer this to the Stewardship Committee.
- Discussion took place regarding holding another safety meeting with the congregation.

information on how they are providing more widespread outpatient therapy by partnering with Hanover schools and with HACC.

- The Homewood at Plum Creek Auxiliary membership drive at Emmanuel resulted in a year-end total of 44 members and donations totaling \$224, plus a \$200 donation from Missions funds. Bingo prizes are always needed. The collection basket is in the auditorium. See Peg Moulton.
- Jody Adelsperger and her husband John were able to purchase 244 cleaning & hygiene items for the New Hope Ministries Food Bank with the \$350 donated from Missions funds.
- The January collection of Communion Gifts totaled 57.5 pounds of food, 27 hygiene items, 3 cleaning products, and a \$10 donation. No products in glass or expired items can be accepted. In addition, 116 pounds of oranges were collected and delivered to the York YMCA Welcome Center before Christmas.
- Crafters have received, made, bought, and bagged 189 winter items this winter season. Items will be available on the clothesline in the courtyard through March.
- We sent Christmas cards to our 3 sponsored children, and received a Christmas letter from Phurbu, our sponsored child in India.
- The York Welcome Center was very grateful for our donation of oranges for the Haitian immigrant community. They continue to face challenges, with 10 people detained by ICE. Local agencies are helping with paper work and legal assistance. We will explore how we can best donate much-needed items.
- The Rail Trail extension is now complete, with construction of a new trailhead parking lot on Route 116 (York Road) set to begin in the spring. We may schedule a walk on a Sunday afternoon, weather permitting. Contact Peg Moulton.
- The Red Kettle collection for The Salvation Army Hanover Unit was a real success, with a collection of \$8,090, well over the expected \$6,000. Thanks to all from Emmanuel who volunteered to help with the collection for three Saturdays at the Hanover Markethouse.
- We encourage volunteers to consider helping with future teas and church events such as Fellowship Hours and Concert Series receptions. We also suggest setting aside possible items for Emmanuel's Yard Sale in September.

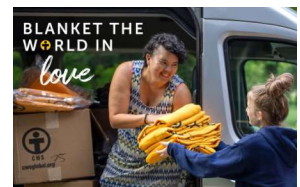
